The Mishna (Avos 6:9) tells the story of Rabbi Yosi ben Kisma, who said: I was once walking on the road when a man met and greeted me and I returned his greetings. He said to me: "Rabbi, where are you from?" I answered: "I am from a great city of sages and scholars." He offered: "Rabbi, would you like to dwell with us in our place? I will give you a million gold dinars, precious stones and pearls." I replied: "If you were to give me all the silver, gold, precious stones and pearls in the world, I would dwell nowhere but in a place of Torah."

Why was R' Yosi so quick to refuse? How did he know for sure that it was not a Makom (place of) Torah? Some explain that he understood the offer to "live in our place" to mean "come and do the Mitzvos in place of us," as we have no time for that. His stance is still perplexing, though. With such an astronomical offer, why didn't he take the money and use it to create a Makom Torah in that city?

The answer is that money alone cannot create a place of Torah; it takes Yegi'ah (toil), Ahava (love), sweat and tears.

We ask daily prior to reciting the Shema, "Instill in our hearts the

wisdom to understand and elucidate, to listen, learn, teach, safeguard, perform and fulfill all the words of your Torah's teaching with love." We ask Hashem to help us attain the ingredient that will enable us to inculcate the Torah's teachings. The Posuk (Mishlei 3:15) says "[The Torah] is more precious than pearls, and all your desires cannot compare to it." That is the attitude that people must have to enable their place to become a Makom Torah; a city that lacks that appreciation has a void that cannot be filled with money.

My family and I arrived in Minneapolis a little more than 15 years ago, and B"H we found a community ripe for further Torah development; the community members' love for Torah and interest in continually growing in Torah was palpable. Community Impact

- The first thing we do in the morning, upon waking up, is to thank Hashem with the words, "Modeh ani l'fanecha, Thanks, I give before you..."
